## Sermon given by Revd. Elaine Jones on Safeguarding Sunday.

## Whalton Church – Matthew 19:13-25

Today is Safeguarding Sunday, which feels especially ironic given the events of the past week. The shocking revelations of yet another failure to prevent and report abuse within the church have been devastating. I had prepared my sermon earlier this week, but then the news broke, and, well, I found myself starting over.

Archbishop Justin Welby's resignation, following a damning report that highlighted major failings in the church's safeguarding practices, was, unfortunately, not surprising. As the leader of the church, it is his responsibility to ensure there are clear channels for reporting and preventing abuse, and to make sure structures are in place to hold perpetrators accountable. The Makin Report made it clear that this responsibility was not met. I know there will be varying opinions on his resignation. Some will see it as the right step, while others may feel he has been unfairly scapegoated. Some may even see this as a political issue, tied to disagreements over issues concerning LLF and the Archbishop's statement about same-sex relationships.

For survivors of abuse, this news may be deeply painful—or perhaps, in some ways, validating. I want to affirm that whatever your perspective is, it's valid. Your feelings are real, and it's important that we make space for them.

But beyond our individual reactions, I hope we can create a platform for understanding, compassion, and grace. As a church, we are called to be a community that validates one another's experiences, offering care, not judgment. After all, isn't that what we are called to be as the body of Christ?

I wish I could promise that such abuses will never happen again, that the church will always be a place of safety. But I can't. What I can say is that safeguarding is all of our responsibility. Preventing abuse, reporting it, and holding those in power accountable is not just the responsibility of church leaders—it is on all of us.

This is not an easy call. Challenging power is difficult. It's tempting to stay silent, to hope someone else will take the lead. I know I have been in situations where I've asked myself, "Wouldn't it be easier to look the other way and let someone else deal with this?" But I'm reminded that it's my

duty—first, as a human being to honour and protect the dignity of every person and call out things that are harmful, but more importantly, as a Christian to live out Jesus' command to love God and love my neighbour.

Even Jesus knew this would be challenging. Following him is costly. Kingdom living is counter-cultural, and it calls us to go against the grain of the world.

In our reading from Matthew, a rich young man asks Jesus how he can enter the kingdom of God. He has followed all the commandments—he hasn't murdered, stolen, or lied—and he feels he's done all the right things. But Jesus tells him it's not enough. He must give up his wealth, his possessions, his security. For the young man, this was too much, and Jesus remarks that it's easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven.

But wealth isn't just about money and possessions—it can also take the form of power, authority, and control. When the powerful come together, it can feel like an impenetrable wall of influence. Those who have been abused feel powerless against this system, which often seeks to silence them.

The abuse cases we've seen within the church share a painful commonality: they were enabled by those who had the power to prevent them but chose not to. The protection of the institution, its reputation, and its leaders took priority over the protection of the vulnerable. Many who tried to expose these crimes were met with resistance from those in power, who chose to hide them in the shadows.

Jesus' message to the rich man is clear: he must give away the things that hold value to him. For many of us, one of those valuable things is our voice. Our voice is a powerful tool that many people don't have. Is this what we're called to give to the poor? To use our voice to speak up for those who have none?

We have the responsibility to challenge systems that enable abuse. We must hold those in power accountable, shining a light on what others would rather keep hidden. Earthly wealth and power may seem significant, but in the Kingdom of God, they hold no value. What matters in God's Kingdom is love, justice, and mercy. And the more we are willing to sacrifice our earthly treasures—our status, power, and privileges—in exchange for God's justice, the more we will receive.

Safeguarding is not an add-on to our Christian life—it is at its very heart. Jesus welcomed everyone, saying, "Let the little children come to me." We must ensure that our church is a place where people can come to know Jesus in safety, without fear of harm or judgment. This requires training, policies, and procedures, yes—but it should also be a joyful part of our worship, as we seek to live according to the commands of Jesus that lead to the Kingdom of God.

James reminds us that those who teach will be judged more strictly. Abuse, cover-ups, and ignoring the voices of survivors are all sinful—but so is judgment without mercy. Jesus held sinners accountable, but he also showed them grace. We must do the same. No one is free to be protected against the consequences of causing hurt to another, especially where there is significant and lasting harm done to another. Abuse of another person in whatever form is abhorrent and no one, absolutely no one, is above the law or should escape the consequences for harming another. It is wrong for anyone to protect those who harm another and there is absolutely no excuse for doing so. Showing mercy does not mean covering up their actions or protecting them from receiving the punishment for their crime. Showing grace does not mean ignoring the sin or allowing people to go unpunished. Showing mercy and grace means admitting our failures and our part, and not shy away from speaking truth into the situation as the instigation for change!

This is a deep wound for the church, and it will take generations to heal. But I pray that we all commit to making the safety of the vulnerable our highest priority. That the voices of survivors will be heard, that abusers will be brought to justice, and that those who lead us will be supported with grace and understanding. For those in leadership, we pray for strength and wisdom, because this is a heavy burden to carry. They may make mistakes, and they may do some significant things that instigate transformation. I pray that there will be significant changes and a catalyst to call out the imbalance of power in the hierarchical structures that plays a role in matters of justice. How? I don't know! But in all things, I trust that God's grace is sufficient to enable kingdom transformation. Amen.
